## **Supporting EHE Enquiries**

Cornwall Council recognises that parents have the right to choose to educate their child at home rather than at school, and that parents choose home education for a variety of reasons. It believes that all parties involved in elective home education should be aware of their roles, rights and responsibilities; and that when parents are deciding to home educate their child, it works well when it is a positive, informed and dedicated choice for parents and the child.

However, this is not the case for all, we know from feedback that some families have reached this option as a last resort. Wherever possible we would encourage parents to make contact with their child's school or with the Education Welfare Service before any final decision has been made, to ensure the parents have considered what is in the best interests of each child and if there is any support we can provide you with in resolving issues.

## **Parental legal obligations**

In accordance with Section 7 of Education Act 1996; by removing a child/young person from a school roll the parent takes full legal responsibility for causing and ensuring the child is **receiving** a suitable, full time and efficient education provision.

- The Local Authority will make enquires about the educational provision and will expect a level of engagement to satisfy their duties.
- Parents who choose to educate their children at home must be prepared to assume full financial responsibility, including bearing the cost of any resources and examinations.

### IGCSE

IGCSEs are International GCSEs.

IGCSE is a registered trademark of the Cambridge exam board but it is informally used as shorthand for all International GCSEs.

Most IGCSEs do not have a compulsory coursework or controlled assessment. They are assessed solely on the exams at the end which is why they are accessible to home educators.

They are aimed at learners aged 14 to 16, and they provide the skills and knowledge to progress to A Levels, International A Levels, and into university. Simply, they provide a simple route into Higher Education in the UK for students around the world by mirroring the UK qualification structure.

## **Documenting and Planning Education.**

To provide a suitable and efficient education provision, monitoring and progressing levels of learning are a key part of the process. This enables children to move through their educational journey. Whilst it is not compulsory to follow the National Curriculum many EHE families use the National Curriculum to structure the progression of learning. There is a range of evidence and methods which can be used to support you in planning and documenting your child's provision.

## Work Experience

Parents should be aware that the exemptions relating to child employment legislation to enable young people to undertake work experience only apply with respect to work experience arranged by a governing body or local authority. Consequently, there is currently no option for Elective Home Education families to arrange work experience opportunities that would be lawful where such activities are in conflict with the legislation restricting child employment.

It is possible for children educated at home to access work experience opportunities through a project called Skills Your Way <u>www.your-way.org.uk/skills/</u> Future Foundations is another project which can provide opportunities for work experience.

#### Skills Your Way

Skills Your Way Project is part of the Education Business Partnership and is funded by the European Social Fund. Aimed at supporting young people aged between 15 – 24 who would like to participate in education, employment and training and are experiencing barriers in these areas, including those with SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disability). Skills your Way offers a one-to-one provision with a wide range of activities designed to develop approaches for the young person to help break down barriers and provide opportunities and support with:

- Gaining employability skills
- Information, advice and guidance and skills assessment
- Employer engagement
- Work experience and taster days
- Various activities designed to build confidence and identify interests and build soft skills such as social skills and teamwork.

## **Juvenile Employment**

Students who are Electively Home Educated are governed by the same laws, with regard to child employment, as any other child. No child of statutory school age is permitted to work, regardless of how they are being educated, unless they have been issued with a work permit by the Local Authority. This also applies to children who may be working part time in the family business or with a self-employed parent, in which case the parent is also classed as the employer of the child. If a child works without a permit, he or she may not be covered by an employer's insurance. The employer can be prosecuted for the illegal employment of children as can parents if this is considered appropriate. If they are found guilty, heavy fines and court costs can follow.

There are restrictions on the type of employment that is permitted for a juvenile and on the number of hours they can work (please see juvenile employment page of Cornwall Council website for further guidance). It should be noted that although Electively Home Educated children do not have to comply with conventional school hours, it is within the spirit of the law that they do comply to the restrictions around working hours for Juveniles. This means they should not be employed during school time and only work two hours on any school day.

These regulations apply to all children from the age of 13 years to the point at which they are no longer of compulsory school age. This date is set as being the last Friday in June in the school year in which they reach the age of 16.
